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5 INTRODUCTION

This Annual Report presents key milestones of the Center for Rehabilitation of Survivors of Acid and burns Violence (CERESAV), which includes activities and interventions for 2024. At CERESAV, we work with Acid Attack Survivors through awareness-raising and public sensitization initiatives, Education fund for Acid Attack Survivors and their Children, GBV trainings, and follow-up meetings to monitor how best they are coping with life following the acid attack. These initiatives follow the strategic processes that we have as an organization for the holistic support for and with the people we serve.

6 OUR VISION AND MISSION

6.1 VISION

A Ugandan society where survivors of acid attacks heal, thrive and live dignified lives.

6.2 MISSION

To improve the livelihood and well-being of survivors of acid attacks, burns and other forms of gender-based violence through treatment and rehabilitation, education, economic empowerment, promoting the rights and interests of survivors and institutional development.

7 PROGRAM DELIVERY AND ACHIEVEMENT

7.1 Awareness and Advocacy:

7.2 Medical Support, Surgical Care, Psychosocial Support

CERESAV saved some funds from the 16 days of Activism campaign. These balances were channeled towards supporting survivors' medical needs. We were able to pay for survivor Charles Kalanzi's surgery and scar treatments after he had complained about pain on his chin scars. We were also able to complete school fees for survivor Yassin's son, after he raised issues about inability to complete payment. Survivor Enos Malinyi boosted his bricks business with the same fund and this has helped him to support his family with more sustainable needs.

CERESAV would love to thank each and every person who put together resources and supported this cause. A special recognition goes to Mr. Chase Adcox who made a very generous donation which enabled the 16 days of Activism campaign to take place.

7.3 Organizational Development

7.3.1 Full Registration of CERESAV

Achieved official registration on the 4th of November 2024 establishing a solid legal framework for operations. Our registration number is 9058 and permit number is 1456.

7.3.2 Financial streamlining

Opened two new bank accounts at DFCU Uganda (USD & UGX), ensuring we are ready to conduct proper and effective transactions (both local and international) and provide accountability to our donors.

7.4 Education Fund Program

Supported 18 children of survivors, providing them with access to quality education and demonstrating our commitment to breaking cycles of poverty and violence. CERESAV fundraising efforts for the Education Fund managed to collect \$4,187 from our partners and donors.

In 2025, CERESAV is committed to achieving the following strategic goals:

1. **Revamping Psycho-Social Support Sessions**
 - Enhancing the quality and reach of psycho-social support programs to better address the mental health and emotional well-being of acid attack and burn survivors.
2. **Economic Empowerment and Reintegration**
 - Strengthening initiatives aimed at economically empowering survivors, enabling them to reintegrate into the economy and regain financial independence.
3. **Comprehensive Research Publication**
 - Publishing a detailed research paper on acid attacks and burns violence, highlighting their prevalence, underlying causes, and the socio-economic impacts. This research will inform public policy and raise awareness about the issue.
4. **Fundraising and Resource Mobilization**
 - Intensifying fundraising efforts to expand support for survivors and sustain CERESAV's initiatives.

Additionally, CERESAV is exploring other specific projects for 2025, aligning with its mission to support survivors and advocate for systemic change. These may include:

- Expanding partnerships with local and international organizations to amplify impact.
- Developing survivor-led initiatives to encourage community-driven solutions.
- Advocating for stronger legislative measures to prevent acid violence and ensure justice for survivors.

These efforts aim to create a significant, lasting impact for survivors and contribute to ending acid violence in Uganda.
